VESPERS

Adapted from the Lutheran Service Book, "vespers" is a Latin word meaning "evening." Originally one of eight daily offices prayed during the Middle Ages, Vespers was retained at the time of the Reformation as one of two chief daily services, the other being Matins (Morning Prayer). "Sunset marks the end of the day and also the beginning of the next day so that the days roll on without interruption. The hours of darkness are experienced as a time of waiting and watching... the unknown, isolation, fear, death, night... but also stillness, rest, peace, and promise. In Christ, the grave is transformed into the morning of new and unending life"


“Slow Lent” Series Overview

The Way of the Heart

Connecting with God through Prayer, Wisdom and Silence

by Henri J.M. Nouwen

In this short but profound book, published in 1981, Henri turns to the spirituality of the Desert Fathers to show his readers a spiritual path away from the noise, busyness and consumerism of modern life toward a life centered in God. He divides this path into three disciplines: **solitude, silence and prayer**, the practice of which leads the individual from preoccupation with the superficiality of ordinary existence into the depth of life devoted to God. **Portions of this series are also inspired by Nouwen’s *Making All Things New* (copies available at Bethel).**

Epistle (New Testament Letter)

Romans 5:12-19 (ESV)

¹²Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned— ¹³for sin indeed was in the world before the law was given, but sin is not counted where there is no law. ¹⁴Yet death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sinning was not like the transgression of Adam, who was a type of the one who was to come.

¹⁵But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if many died through one man's trespass, much more have the grace of God and the free gift by the grace of that one man Jesus Christ abounded for many. ¹⁶And the free gift is not like the result of that one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brought justification. ¹⁷If, because of one man's trespass, death reigned through that one man, much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man Jesus Christ.

¹⁸Therefore, as one trespass led to condemnation for all men, so one act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all men. ¹⁹For as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.



Sermon **“Slow Lent: Solitude in Communion With God For Community”**
Matthew 4:1-11



Compassion is the fruit of solitude...(33). Compassion is hard because it requires the inner disposition to go with others to the place where they are weak, vulnerable, lonely, and broken....[O]ur greatest gift [to others] is our ability to enter into solidarity with those who suffer.

It is in solitude that this compassionate solidarity grows. In solitude we realize that nothing [in the human experience] is alien to us, that the roots of all conflict, war, injustice, cruelty, hatred, jealousy, and envy are deeply anchored in our own heart. In solitude our heart of stone can be turned into a heart of flesh, a rebellious heart into a contrite heart, and a closed heart into a heart that can open itself to all suffering people in a gesture of solidarity.

[I]n and through solitude we do not move away from people. On the contrary, we move closer to them through compassionate ministry.




