



Worship in a traditional order drawing words from Year 2 of the Narrative Lectionary from the appointed readings from the Old Testament, Acts, and 1 Corinthians.






Invocation (based on Deuteronomy 6:4-6)

- P: In the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.
- P: Years ago Moses said, "Hear, O Israel." Today I say, "Hear, O people of God."
- C: We hear!
- P: Then declare the words of faith which God gave to your ancestors through Moses:
- C: The LORD is our God, the LORD is one!
 - We love the LORD our God with all our soul and all our heart and all our strength.
- P: Keep these words in mind today even as we enter into His presence in worship.
- C: The LORD is our God, the LORD is one!

Confession and Absolution (Hosea 11:1-9)

P: The Lord spoke to His people through the prophet Hosea:

"The more I summoned them, the farther they departed from Me.

They sacrificed to the Baal idols and burned incense to images."

C: We, too, are confronted with our sin:

God took us by the arm,

but we did not acknowledge that He has saved us.

God lifted the yoke of sin from our necks,

placing the burden on Jesus,

but we have often refused to repent!

We look for help in ourselves and in others and in false things.

We know we continue to turn away from the Lord God.

Forgive our sinful hearts for the sake of Jesus Christ who died and rose again. Amen.

P: Again the Lord spoke to His people through the prophet Hosea,

and He speaks these words of His enduring love to us:

"How can I give you up? How can I surrender you?

How can I treat you like a people destined for destruction?

How can I make you like a city wiped off the face of the Earth?

I will show you mercy, pulling back the punishment that you deserve.

All My tender compassions are aroused.

I will not carry out My fierce anger!

I cannot totally destroy you!


Because I am God—the Holy One among you—

I will not come in wrath!"

Therefore, based on this promise of God's steadfast love, in the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.





Preparation for the Reading of the Word (based on 2 Kings 23:1-3)

- P: When King Josiah heard that a lost and forgotten book of God's Word had been found in the temple, he called together all of the people, and like today
- C: all the people were there, from the youngest to the oldest.
- P: The king read aloud all the words of the scroll of the covenant. He called on the people to commit themselves to God's Word, as we do today:
- C: all the people are here, from the youngest to the oldest, to hear God's own Word. Amen.

This Week's Narrative Lectionary Reading

Mark 12:1-17 (VOICE)

Note on the Reading

(VOICE)

The religious leaders had asked Jesus where His authority comes from. What gives Him the right to heal people on the Sabbath, teach about God, do miracles, and cast out demons? Who exactly does He think He is—and where does His authority come from? This question is a trap: if He claims His authority is from God, then they can argue that God does not endorse someone who breaks His laws; but if He says His authority is His own, then He will be in trouble with the crowds and perhaps even with the Roman governor.

Jesus, however, issues a challenge: I'll tell you what you want to know if you'll answer My question first. But He asks them an impossible question ("John's baptism—was it from heaven, or of human origin?")—an impossible question <u>not</u> because they don't know the answer, but because they <u>don't want to</u> say the answer and admit that Jesus is sent by God. So Jesus tells them a story.

Jesus: There was a man who established a vineyard. He put up a wall around it to fence it in; he dug a pit for a winepress; he built a watchtower. When he had finished this work, he leased the vineyard to some tenant farmers and went away to a distant land.

²When the grapes were in season, he sent a slave to the vineyard to collect *his rent*—his share of the fruit. ³ But the farmers grabbed the slave, beat him, and sent him back to his master empty-handed. ⁴ The owner sent another slave, and this slave the farmers beat over the head and sent away dishonored. ⁵ A third slave, the farmers killed. This went on for some time, with the farmers beating some of the messengers and killing others *until* the owner had lost all patience. ⁶ He had a son whom he loved above all things, and he said to himself, "When these thugs see my son, they'll know he carries my authority. They'll have to respect him."

⁷ But when the tenant farmers saw the owner's son coming, they said among themselves, "Look at this! It's the son, the heir to this vineyard. If we kill him, then the land will be ours!" ⁸ So they seized him and killed him and threw him out of the vineyard.

⁹ Now what do you suppose the owner will do when he hears of this? He'll come and destroy these farmers, and he'll give the land to others.

¹⁰ Haven't you read the Scriptures? As the psalmist says,

The stone that the builders rejected has become the very stone that holds together the entire foundation.

11 This is the work of the Eternal One, and it is marvelous in our eyes.

¹² The priests, scribes, temple leaders, and elders knew the story was directed against them. They couldn't figure out how to lay their hands on Jesus then because they were afraid the people would rise up against them. So they left Him alone, and they went away furious.

¹³ Then some Pharisees and some of Herod's supporters banded together to try to entrap Jesus. ¹⁴ They came to Him and complimented Him.

Pharisees: Teacher, we know You are truthful in what You say and that You don't play favorites. You're not worried about what anyone thinks of You, so You teach with total honesty what God would have us do. So tell us: is it lawful that we Jews should pay taxes to the Roman emperor or not? ¹⁵ Should we give or not?

Jesus (seeing through their ruse): Why do you test Me like this? Listen, bring Me a coin so that I can take a look at it.

¹⁶ When they had brought it to Him, He asked them another question.

Jesus: Tell Me, whose picture is on this coin? And of whom does this inscription speak?

Pharisees: Caesar, of course.

Jesus: ¹⁷ Then give to the emperor what belongs to the emperor. And give to God what belongs to God.

They could not think of anything to say to His response.

L: This is the Gospel of the Lord.

C: Thanks be to God.

Collect (Prayer of the Day)

P: Let us pray. Heavenly Father, thank You for Your wonderful Word of truth and what it teaches us about Your kingdom and salvation. May we take to heart all that You want us to believe and trust. Give us understanding hearts, teachable spirits, and the desire to do Your will, to the glory of Your holy Name, for You reign with Your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord, and the Holy Spirit, forever and ever.

C: Amen.

1 Corinthians 15:1-6a,20-22,58 (ESV)


P: Now, brothers and sisters, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, which you received and on which you have taken your stand. By this gospel you are saved, if you hold firmly to the word I preached to you. Otherwise, you have believed in vain. For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance:

- C: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Peter, and then to the Twelve. After that, he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time. Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. 





Prayers

Preparation for the Lord's Supper

All Christians who are baptized and have been instructed are invited to receive Communion with us if you believe as we do—that the bread is the body of Christ, and the wine is the blood of Christ, truly present for us for the forgiveness of our sins.



If this is a new teaching to you, or if this is different than you believe,


we ask that you wait to commune until we've had a further chance to talk. We invite those who are not communing to come to the rail, cross your arms, and receive a blessing from the Lord.

Communion Distribution

- Pastor distributes the bread, and the Elders distribute the wine—with individual cups or common cup. The individual trays also contain alcohol-removed wine in the center of each tray in the purple cups.
- Each side will be ushered from the center aisle to the communion rail, row by row, starting with the front.
- Go to the rail on your side of the sanctuary, filling in starting with the outside wall towards the center.
- Once you have received the elements, you
 may remain at the rail for prayer and leave at your own pace.
- Return to your seat using the outside aisle.
- Use the distribution time to prepare yourself for communion, sing the hymns as prayers to God, and maintain this as meditative time.

Preface of the Lord's Supper (based on 2 Samuel 5:1-5)

- P: The Lord be with you.
- C: And also with you.
- P: When God made David to be King over Israel, the people came to him saying:
- C: "We are your very flesh and blood!"
- P: David was their true King, even as the Lord had said to him:
- C: "You will shepherd my people Israel."
- P: But now we have One who is even greater than David—Jesus, and we come to Him saying:
- C: We are Your very flesh and blood!
- P: Jesus is our true King, who lays down His life for His sheep, even as the Lord said to Him:
- C: "You will shepherd My people."
- P: Jesus shares in our flesh and blood, and by His death and resurrection, through this holy meal, He gives us His body and blood for the forgiveness of our sins.
- C: This bread and wine is Your very flesh and blood!
 We are Your sheep, and You are the Good Shepherd King. Amen.



The Lord's Prayer


P: Lord, remember us in Your kingdom, and teach us to pray:



Words of Institution

Pax Domini (The Peace of the Lord)

P: The peace of the Lord be with you always. **C:** And also with you. (We greet one another in peace saying "God's peace" or "The Lord be with you.")





Post-Communion Prayer (based on Exodus 3:7-8)

P: Let us pray. Father Most Holy, even as You saw Your people in slavery and in Egypt and rescued them by Your powerful hand, so You have surely seen our affliction in slavery to sin. You have heard our cries and know our sorrows. Your Son has come down to deliver us and to bring us up from the grave to life after death through His cross and resurrection. We rejoice to receive this Gospel through His body and blood. Guide us in our continued wandering until that day when You send Your Son to bring us all to Your promised land of the new life; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord.

C: Amen.

Benediction (Blessing) (based on Deuteronomy 6:4-8)

P: Hear, O people of God.

C: We hear!

P: Declare the words of faith which God gave to your ancestors through Moses:

C: The LORD is our God, the LORD is one!


We love the LORD our God with all our soul and all our heart and all our strength.
